

WEEK 9

Pillar #4 - Discipleship

Returning to Second Timothy, we now study our final pillar as a church: discipleship. Paul charges Timothy to share everything he has learned from him with others who will then do the same. This means that our understanding of Jesus and His work should not be kept secret; it should be lived out and passed on to others. Discipleship, in other words is an intentional process where we are intentionally connecting in the lives of others, to intentionally lead them to deepening understanding and devotion to Christ.

THE SCRIPTURE

2 TIMOTHY 2:1-7

¹ You then, my child, be strengthened by the grace that is in Christ Jesus, ² and what you have heard from me in the presence of many witnesses entrust¹⁵ to faithful men, who will be able to teach others also. ³ Share in suffering as a good soldier of Christ Jesus. ⁴ No soldier gets entangled in civilian pursuits, since his aim is to please the one who enlisted him. ⁵ An athlete is not crowned unless he competes according to the rules. ⁶ It is the hard-working farmer who ought to have the first share of the crops. ⁷ Think over what I say, for the Lord will give you understanding in everything.
